## SES NationState Survey 2005W1

SES' latest random telephone survey of 1,000 Canadians was completed between January 28 and February 2, 2005. The survey is accurate to within 3.1 percentage points, plus or minus, 19 times out of 20. The margin of accuracy will be wider for sub samples. Percentages may exceed 100 due to rounding. The research was registered with the Marketing Research and Intelligence Association, Canada's governing body for market and public opinion research.

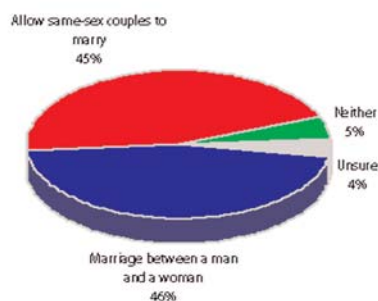
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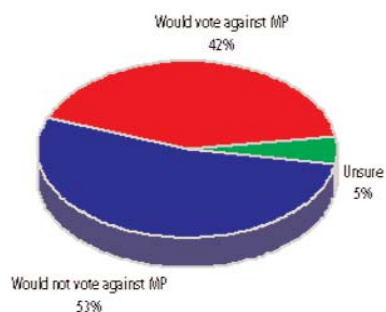
