

Liberal Party and Paul Martin Strong Grits Potentially Vulnerable on Performance

Ottawa – February 2, 2004 – A national survey of Canadians released by polling firm SES Canada Research Inc. indicates that the Liberal Party and Paul Martin continue to enjoy strong support but Liberal government performance is considered average by a significant number of Canadians.

Current SES polling among decided voters puts the federal Liberals at 48% (down 1%), the Conservatives at 23%, the NDP at 15% (up 3%), the Bloc Quebecois at 11% (up 1%) and the Green Party at 3%. Twenty-one percent of Canadians were undecided in the most recent wave of SES polling. Since the merger of the Canadian Alliance and the Progressive Conservative the only major party to register an increase in support was the NDP - 3% (but still within the margin of accuracy for the national poll).

One half of Canadians polled (50%) consider Paul Martin the best choice for Prime Minister, with his closest challenger being Stephen Harper at 8% nationally.

Asked to rate the Liberal government led by Paul Martin, 35% described the government as average, 30% very good/good, 13% poor/very poor and 23% of Canadians were undecided.

"Polling indicates that although Paul Martin and the Liberals remain very popular, the ruling Grits may be vulnerable on performance. After more than 10 years in power almost one of every four Canadians cannot form an opinion on their performance," stated SES President Nikita Nanos.

"The upcoming federal election will see the parties compete to define the ballot question. On the one hand the Liberals will likely focus on Paul Martin and the future, while the opposition Conservatives and New Democrats will likely focus on the Liberal record and Paul Martin's key role over the past ten years," noted Nanos.

SES's National Omnibus Survey is conducted every three months. It is based on a random telephone sample of 1,000 Canadians, 18 years of age and older and was

conducted between January 26th to January 29th, 2004. The margin of accuracy for the aggregate survey results is 3.1 percentage points, plus or minus, 19 times out of 20. Within the larger sample sub-groups may have a wider margin of accuracy. Validation of the demographic profile of respondents indicates that the poll is a fair representation of the Canadian populace. The survey was registered with the Canadian Survey Research Council of which SES is a member.

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

COMMENTARY

The federal Liberals currently enjoy a 25 point margin over their nearest competitor, the newly formed Conservative Party (CP).


Polling indicates that support for the united Conservative Party is lower than the combined totals of the Canadian Alliance and Progressive Conservative parties.

As the Conservative Party goes through a transition phase leading up to the selection of a leader and the development of a national platform, it is expected that voter support will remain stable or marginally decline.

The selection of the new leader will be the first indicator to voters of the direction and tone of the new party.

Note: Plus/minus index scores are based on the difference between the sub-group and the sample average. For example a +11 score for the Liberals in Atlantic Canada would indicate that their support is 11% higher in Atlantic Canada than the national average. Considering the sample size of 1,000 voters, readers should focus on scores of +/-5 or greater.

THE METHODOLOGY

Between January 26^{th} and January 29^{th} , 2004, SES conducted a total of 1,000 telephone interviews across Canada with eligible voters as part of the SES National Quarterly Omnibus. Aggregate results are accurate \pm 3.1%, 19 times out of 20. Validation of the demographic profile of respondents indicates that the poll is a fair representation of Canadian voters.



COMMENTARY

Although Paul Martin personally is very popular and the clear choice as Prime Minister, a significant number of voters consider the government performance as average (35%) or cannot form an opinion (26%).

The fact that at the time of the Chretien resignation a series of key national issues remained unresolved or uncertain (same-sex marriage, decriminalization of marijuana, Canada-US relations) may lead to Liberal vulnerability on its performance and accomplishments.



Note: Plus/minus index scores are based on the difference between the sub-group and the sample average. For example a $+12\,\text{SG}$ score for the Liberals in Atlantic Canada would indicate that 12% more Atlantic Canadians think the Liberals have done a somewhat good job compared to the national average. Considering the sample size of 1,000 voters, readers should focus on scores of +/-5 or greater.

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
